

Student Achievement: NSCAS 3rd - 8th Grade












Student Achievement: MAP Growth 3rd - 9th

Blair Community Schools began testing students using MAP Growth assessments in 2014. The MAP assessment will become the Nebraska State test in 2021.


A **RIT score represents a point on a continuous scale of learning**. We use them for measuring an individual student's progress over time. It indicates the difficulty level at which the student is answering about 50% of the questions correctly. Although it is possible to score as high as 265 or more on the reading test and 285 or more on the math test, 240 (reading) and 250 (math) are typical top scores.


We expect RIT scores to increase over time. Students at lower grade levels tend to show a greater increase in RIT scores (10 to 14 points) during a school year than students in higher grade levels (2-5 points). At higher levels, questions get much harder and the overall growth is a smaller proportion of all that one knows. **Anticipated** growth rates for each student are based on national norms and should be viewed as "typical," not expected.






MATH Cohort RIT Over Time: Fall 2015-Winter 2019

State Classifications

Every school in Blair reached a GREAT status for 2018-19 on Nebraska's Accountability System called AQUESST.

Schools are classified as Excellent, Great, Good, or Needs Improving. That is an improvement over the 2017-18 school year, when just 80% of our schools were classified as Great.

Twelve percent of Nebraska schools each year are classified as Excellent. We aspire to have all of BCS schools reach Excellent status and are focused on day to day growth to reach that goal.

Continuous Improvement

BCS coordinates **professional** collaborative school-wide learning communities that meet to reflect on professional practice, examine student data, and identify strategies directly applicable to improving instruction and learning. Teachers, Principals, and Administrators also collaborates with the educational community to develop, implement, monitor, and revise a school improvement **plan** that is aligned with district, state, and federal guidelines and goals. This includes monitoring the achievement of each student using data to make informed decisions about student learning. teacher effectiveness, and overall school improvement.



BCS implements a **school-wide documented professional learning plan** that is developed based on staff input, aligned to the school's continuous improvement. In collaboration with the educational community, teachers **align the school's curriculum and high quality instructional materials to district and state content standards** to ensure cultural responsiveness and high expectations for student learning processes that is evaluated and adjusted based on participant feedback and student outcome data.

BCS supports teacher and administrators growth as instructional leaders, to lead a continuous improvement process that results in improved student growth and achievement, enhanced student and staff well-being, and greater school effectiveness.

District Highlights

Overall, **Blair Community Schools** had three percent more students reach proficient status in Reading Language Arts and five percent more in Science. In Math, four percent more students reached proficiency.

Some highlights to celebrate is **5th grade increased the number of students proficient in Math by 17%** and **4th grade had 10% more students proficient** over the previous year in Math. Also, there were really nice gains in 11th grade where **5% more students were proficient** in Math.

In **Reading**, again the 5th grade had a significant gain, **increasing proficient students by 15%** over the 2017-18 school year. There was also really nice improvements in 4th, 8th, and 11th grade.

Blair Community Schools performs best in the area of **Science**. **Nine percent more students** were proficient in 11th grade and there was a **5% increase in 8th grade**.

Blair Community Schools has made significant changes for this school year to add **time and support to increase academic achievement**. At Otte Middle School, **13 minutes was added to each day** so that math, reading/language arts, and science time could be doubled from 47 minutes daily to 74 minutes. At Arbor Park, reading and language arts, was increased to 90 minutes and there is an additional 30 minutes for writing. Plus, math time at Arbor Park has increased to 60 minutes in fifth and 80 minutes in 3rd and 4th.

At Blair High School, **15 minutes was added to** each school day and a new Tutorial is held each Thursday in place of AEP, where students receive extra time and support every day for extra practice and instruction from their teacher outside of their regular instructional time. Middle school and high school students can come in Friday mornings during PLC time to continue their learning or do retesting. At Arbor we also offer **30 minutes of extra time and support every** day beyond core instruction where students can get interventions and extensions to push students who need extra challenge.





Student Activity and Athletics Highlights

BCS is proud of its students, coaches, and sponsors for their dedication in activities.

In **volleyball**, the Bears won their first game at Districts and lost in the Sub-District Final match to Bennington. In softball, the Bears won Sub-Districts and traveled to Hastings for an opportunity to qualify for the State Tournament. The Bears fought hard losing the second game 4-3 on a late inning rally by Hastings.

Three Blair students qualified for State in **girls' cross country**. At State, sophomore **Sophia Baedke** medaled and finished 15th and **Mary Roskens** narrowly missed medaling, finishing in 19th-place. **Grace Galbraith** also qualified.

The wrestling team won the Class B State Dual Team Championship in 2018-19 and finished as Eastern Midlands Conference Champions in 2019-20.

The **boys' cross country team** qualified for the State Tournament. Congratulations **Sam Lueders** who finished 3rd and the boys finished 9th as a team. **Aiden Klanderud** was 41st, **Zac Boswell** was 44th, **Jacob Rupp** was 55th, **Ethan Funk** was 70th and **Mason Bell** was 76th.

The **Bears' football team** qualified for the State Playoffs for the fourth season in a row. The Bears led the #1 seed Omaha Skutt for almost half of the game, but eventually lost, ending another successful season.

The **Blair girls' golf team** qualified for State for the first time since 2012. The Bears finished 11th overall. Junior, **Rachel Parks** finished 19th overall just missing a medal. **Anna Moore, Kaia Stewart, Ava Rech, Mallory Stirek** all qualified for State.

Congratulations to Schmitt Music's 2019 Educators of the Year **Ms. Chiyo Trauernicht**. She is the coordinator of the annual Blair Middle School Honor Band Festival, which hosts over 230 students from more than 60 schools. She has previously received the NSBA Jack R. Snider Young Band Director Award in 2012 and the NMEA Bryan R. Johnson Distinguished Service Award in 2017. She has served as middle level chairs for Nebraska Bandmasters Association and Nebraska Music Education Association and as the President-Elect of NSBA.

Congratulations to **Caitlyn Haggstrom**, a sophomore, who auditioned and was selected to attend the All-National Honor Band Ensemble, which represents the top performing high school musicians in each state across the country. Caitlyn is the first student from Blair to attend, and only one of two people from Nebraska to be selected for the concert band.

Mr. Hutsell and Blair's Vocal Music Department was selected once again to perform in the Omaha Symphony's Choral Collaborative giving vocal students an "unparalleled experience." BCS vocal students had the opportunity to perform world-class repertoire, work with professional soloists, and participate in an intense learning and rehearsal process with the artistic staff of a professional orchestra, the Omaha Symphony at the Holland Center.

Ms. McNamara led 51 high school students in performing *Fiddler on the Roof*.

In 2016, **the Blair Bear Backers** was established as a 100% volunteer organization with the mission to provide in-kind and financial support to Blair High School athletics and activities. **The Bear Backers** have raised over \$140,000 to support different projects around Blair High School. Such as renovations of the Press Box at Krantz Field, to purchase a new electronic display sign located in the student parking lot, to support the purchase of a digital Hall Of Fame Kiosk and to support funding for a new Athletic Training Room.

10. Implement a succession plan to proactively identify and develop new leaders to succeed and meet the future leadership needs of the district.





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


11. Actively engage internal and external stakeholders to build and sustain an effective partnership between the district and the community of Blair.
